 - Prevent deterioration of quality; concern is after its hits the ground, rain pretty clean

 - Education probably biggest component at the city level
 - DNR agrees, sees it daily in job. People don't get it or want to deal with it unless its explained to them
 - People like "opendoor" policy freedom to choose what they want to do
 - DNR regs and PCA regs in the area of shoreland development have been good
 - Need to go to somebody to find out what they need to do, DNR has been doing good in this area
 - P2 may have a place here, get management closer to the source of the problem
 - Construction of Wal-Mart in Willmar went very well, went well because Wal-Mart has been tagged by EPA

- MPCA having enforcement helps make people aware
- Enforce areas of smaller than 1ac.
- Redwood county enforcement gets more attention than the education
- Discussion on what authorities DNR has for actions that are not related to shoreland or wetland. No other Stormwater related actions can they write tickets on
- Having locals as a resource to go to. Engineers like things defined, that's what's good about the permitting process.
- 3. What currently is not working the way you would like or what issues/opportunities do you see?
 - Working around them during the construction process to preserve them. Area has shortage of wetlands. Want to see wetlands come back.
 - Govt programs to help restore may work
 - Mitigation too easy, need to do more restoration.
 - CRP or RIM not available for mitigation
 - Need to get program started so others can see benefit
 - Small retention ponds have worked in development areas, timeframe tends to be long, and perception developer got by with something.
 - Double standards; rules not uniformly applied, comes from lack of enforcement
 - Ag and farm programs
 - PCA could do some local training, a step in the right direction to help eliminate some of the inconsistencies.
 - Watershed district has know enforcement authority
 - Tillage practices create major sediment
 - Recreational tiling has created problems
 - AG has been left out of the picture
 - Storm ponds creating P problems and mosquito issues
 - Educate people on problems
 - Disconnect between NPDES program and Stormwater management
 - Enforcement part is not there, not enough people to cover area
 - Minnesota ahead of other states in their enforcement effort
 - Environment magazine good source of information, not hitting the target audience
 - Target contractor associations, they seem to get the tickets, and they didn't know
 - Rules and rule changes need to be made more available
 - People don't care until it affects them
 - Contractor should be required to be certified for erosion/sediment control
 - CREP and have had more effect on Stormwater than any enforcement

 - Required Certification for contractors
 - Education of cities and counties

- Can't rely on state for everything, education is key, invite contractors in for a meeting and tell them what they needed to do Work at local level rather than from the top down
- Salt on roadways, where is PCA going with this
- Not fair playing field due to political issues, big business pressure
- Need to take small steps to work with local people, help them understand the rules
- Redevelop storm sewer program for city. Going to need to pay more money to get programs
- Cleaning up mess we have, storm water not point source but what comes from the sky
- Need to look at P2 applied to Stormwater
- Educating the public
